Key enquiry question- How does the UK differ to other countries around the world, how and in what way/s?

National Curriculum Objectives:

- Name and locate counties and cities of the United Kingdom, geographical regions and their identifying human and physical characteristics, key topographical features (including hills, mountains, coasts and rivers), and land-use patterns; and understand how some of these aspects have changed over time.
- Understand geographical similarities and differences through the study of human and physical geography of a region of the United Kingdom, and other countries
- Use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to: key human features, including: city, town, village, factory, farm, house, office, port, harbour and shop.



Key vocabulary

Word	Meaning
Region	An area of land that has common features.
County	A geographical region of a country.
Agriculture	Using land for farming and crop growing.
Topographical features	Key geographical physical features such as rivers, hills, mountains etc.
