Key Enquiry Question: What are the differences between Ludgershall and Nairobi?

National Curriculum Objectives:

- Understand geographical similarities and differences through studying a small area of a non-European country.
- Identify seasonal and daily weather patterns in the UK and the location of hot countries in relation to the equator and north and South Pole.
- Use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to: key physical features, including: beach, cliff, coast, forest, hill, mountain, sea, ocean, river, soil, valley, vegetation, season and weather.



Key vocabulary

Word	Meaning
Human Feature	Things that have been built by people.
Physical Feature	Things that are made by nature.
Vegetation	A group of plant species and the ground cover they provide found in a particular area or habitat.
Weather	The state of the atmosphere at a particular place and time.
Non-European	A country that is not in Europe.
Season	The four divisions of the year (spring, summer, autumn, and winter) marked by particular weather patterns and daylight hours.
Equator	An imaginary line drawn around the middle of the earth from the poles, dividing the earth into northern and southern hemispheres.

Sticky Knowledge:

The equator runs through Africa, which is a continent.

Nairobi is usually dry and hot.

Houses are built differently according to which part of the world you are in.

Cities have buildings made of brick.

African villages have mud houses.
